ASP provides life-changing short-term Christian mission trip opportunities, bringing youth, adult, and college volunteers into rural Central Appalachia to make homes warmer, safer, and drier for families in

The cost will be \$400 dollars a person. Adults are asked to contribute the full amount and each youth participant is asked to contribute \$200 toward the trip. MUMC will fund \$100 per youth and we hope to raise the remaining amount (about \$1000) through youth fundraisers.

Thanks to the church family, the Chili Cook-Off raised \$469 which will be support sending youth to camp (Taylor Hope Fund) and missions.






Lenten Mission Project By Michelle Black

The Capital Area Agency on Aging (http://sc-caaa.camp7.org/page-631270) has a local office here in Charles City. Their "Support a Senior" program aids seniors who have urgent health and safety needs, such as walkway and home repair.

There are giving jars (our country church version of mite boxes*) available for each household. Please take one home and prayerfully consider your special offering during Lent then bring the jars back at Easter. Your spare change and other donations can have a tremendous impact on the lives of the needy. We are called to help when we can, as we are all God, and equally in need of His mercy and grace. * A mite is a small coin or donation. A mite box (also called an alms box or poor box) is used to save coins for charitable purposes. Contemporary mite boxes are usually made of cardboard and given out to church congregations during the Lenten season.

Looking Forward

Mark 2:21-22: "No one sews a piece of unshrunk cloth on an old cloak; other-

wise, the patch pulls away from it, the new from the old, and a worse tear is made. And no one puts new wine into old wineskins; otherwise, the wine will burst the skins, and the wine is lost, and so are the skins; but one puts new wine into fresh wineskins." (NRSV)

I had the honor of preaching on this passage at the United Methodist Church of Palm Springs on the first Sunday of Lent as part of an initiative of CST to reach out to local congregations. I thought, "Oh, it's in Palm Springs. It's mostly retired people and those who travel to warm weather during the winter. It's probably pretty low-key and easy going."

I was so wrong. This church was vibrant and loud and energetic. It helps that the pastor is a former actress and performer and the congregation loves music. I was so pleasantly surprised and was really able to gain some energy.

I was also surprised when I received great feedback on my sermon. Not because I thought it didn't go well but because I thought it wouldn't be well received. I told this congregation of mostly retired people that the church needs to for us all to come together, reflect, and change. Older people don't like change, right? Apparently that stereotype is just that because these people were excited to move forward and see where the United Methodist Church can go. It was an incredibly humbling, exciting, and encouraging experience. An excellent way to begin the season of Lent when we look forward with anticipation to the saving work of Jesus on the cross.

5 whole cloves

1½ tsp. salt

INCINNATI CHILI

2 lbs. lean ground beef

2 medium onions

2 - 8oz, cans of tomato sauce

5 whole allspice ½ tsp. red pepper flakes

1 tsp. ground cumin

4 Tbsp. chili powder

¼ tsp. cinnamon 1 bay leaf

Add ground beef to the water. Stirring to a fine texture, boiling slowing for a half hour. Add all the other ingredients, bring to a boil. Reduce heat, simmer for 3 hours. Refrigerate. Scrape off any fat, remove spices (whole cloves, etc.). Add kidney beans if desired serve with shredded cheese, sour cream, and chopped green onions.

Tax Deductions for In-Kind Donations

We are all familiar with getting a tax deduction for weekly church donations. You may not be familiar with is the ability to get a tax deduction for the things you purchase for the church and have a receipt and for items you donate to the church



but do not have a receipt. These types of donations are called "In-Kind" contributions.

Examples of donations with supporting receipts might include items bought for Sunday School, or VBS, office supplies, food purchases for sponsored events, and similar items.

Undocumented donations might include kitchen appliances, furniture, building supplies, garden tools, and similar items.* For this type of donation, the individual or family making the contribution is responsible for determining the value of the donation but the church is not allowed to assign a value for donations without receipts.




Upon request, the church will provide a receipt for either type of In-Kind donation. For income tax purposes, that receipt will state that you did not receive any goods or services in return for any of these contributions other than

"intangible religious benfits" (IRS terminology, not ours). If you need a receipt for an In-Kind donation, please see Joanne Daniel or Kevin Slattum.

Memorial UMC thanks you for your generosity and commitment to Jesus Christ by making monetary and In-Kind donations.

* Board of Trustees approval is required before the church may accept donation of furniture, major appliances, tools, and other large items.





James Hudson Binns, Bobby and Alexander Yates were recent visitors in Washington.






